LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT + CEO

ANSWERING GOD'S CALL

Meet the Jernigans. If you told Lacy and Scott Jernigan a year ago that they would be foster parents with an 18-yearold young woman living with them and their twin toddlers, they probably wouldn't know what to think.

It all started when Lacey realized that something was not quite right with one of the young women in the small group she led at Browns Bridge Church. She knew action needed to be taken, which meant reporting some things about Morgan's current living situation. This resulted in Morgan's removal from her home.

Despite several attempts at finding a new home for Morgan, she was eventually placed in a group home and God started to nudge Lacey and Scott's hearts.

"I was having dreams about taking her in," says Lacey. "I felt like God wanted us to be involved in her life, but we didn't know what that meant."

Scott and Lacey got permission from the state to bring her to and from church so that she could keep some of the connections she had made there. Eventually they both knew what to do.

"I soon knew that I wanted to call her my own, but I was afraid to tell my husband that I felt like God wanted us to take her in." says Lacey. "I prayed, 'God if this is what you really want for her, you are going to have to tell Scott yourself.' How could I ask my husband to take in a teenage girl when our twin daughters had just turned one?"

"We have been overwhelmed with all the support. This has been the most amazing journey."



Within a week Scott approached Lacey and said "OK. What do we need to do to keep her?"

"I lost it," Lacey said, "I knew what God had already placed in my heart and He clearly placed it in my husband's heart too."

There was only one barrier. They needed to become licensed foster parents – a process that often takes the better part of 6 months.

Enter FaithBridge and the Fostering Together ministry at church partner North Point Community Church.

Working together, they expedited the training and home study process so that the Jernigans were approved within two months, despite significant barriers, including a major flood in their home.

It took another three months, but on December 1 they finally brought Morgan home. Their Community of Care supported them in countless ways, including mentoring Morgan and a bedroom renovation project by their small group.

Being foster parents was never something they thought of, according to Lacey. "We tend to think of the foster parents we know as superheroes and we could never live up to that."

They have since learned that it has nothing to do with having any special talent, just faith in God.

"None of this has been easy by any means," said Lacey, "but we have never felt more purpose in anything we have done. All it takes is to be obedient to that one next step God calls you to, and He will take care of the details and carry you through."





As Georgia's largest Christ-centered Licensed Child Placing Agency, FaithBridge Foster Care's model of partnering with churches creates growing and sustainable foster care ministries. We partner with local churches offering both traditional and therapeutic programs and we help recruit, train, license, and support foster families within each ministry. By placing children in loving Christian homes, providing Biblically based training, guiding our churches to develop a Community of Care for each family and providing a FaithBridge Family Consultant (our version of a case worker who partners with each family on their fostering journey) our families never foster alone.



THE CRISIS

We are starting to see some stabilization in the numbers of children in foster care, but with approximately 14,300 children still in care and 5,300 licensed foster parents we are still facing a crisis for the children of Georgia.

LETTERS OF SUPPORT

Meet the Tommasellos. Foster parents, Jaime and Craig Tommasello where very cautious about meeting Haley at first. They started getting to know her during pick up and drop off of her son, their foster child, Andrew. They quickly realized that she was open to having a relationship with them.

Soon, Jaime was sharing a picture of Andrew every day since Haley worked six days a week and only got to visit him once a week. Craig admitted that he was more cautious at the beginning but when he saw that Haley was taking responsibility, it helped him to let his guard down.

"She took full responsibility and acknowledged that we were just the foster parents, we didn't take her son away" Craig reflected, "Haley didn't fight us or view us as a part of the system."

By the time Andrew left the Tommasello home to be reunited with Haley, Jaime and Craig were intentional about letting her know that she could still reach out to them if ever she needed support.

"I would send letters home when children in our care would visit with their biological parents," Jaime explained. "When baby Andrew returned home, we sent a letter to say Haley

can call us if she needed anything. We did not know if she would respond but we hoped she would."

The next week. she did.

Haley called to say that Andrew had the flu and the daycare wouldn't take him for the day. The Tommasellos where there to help.

"I was just so happy she called," Jaime explained. If Haley couldn't find a sitter, she wouldn't be able to go to work that day. The Tommasellos were happy to take baby Andrew while he recovered. Shortly after, Haley caught the flu. In between coughs and sneezes, she told Jaime that she would be on her way to get Andrew.

"We can keep him until you recover," Jaime shared. She could hear the relief in Haley's voice.

It can be difficult for biological parents to reach out for support when they need it but the Tommasellos made it that much easier for Haley by sending a simple letter of support to open the door for Haley to connect to them even after her baby returned home. This is the type of support that all parents need. When a parent does not have these resources and family support their chances of success are reduced

filled with moments that can leave foster families feeling overwhelmed. There are many ways to be the back-up support for children and families in need. There are moments when this back-up support can save the day.

Carmen Abernathy and her Sunday School class do just that. They work with Mt. Bethel's "Called to Care" ministry and provide priceless ongoing support to foster families.

The class – launched in 1990 by Carmen and her husband - is made up of about 35 retirement-age people who have consistently met every Sunday for 30 years.

"We have always done different community projects and mission projects." Carmen explained, "About three years ago we decided that we wanted to have one primary focus."

Carmen met with Stephanie Watts, the "Called to Care" Ministry Liaison, and asked what this group could do to support the church's foster care ministry.

Here are some ways they support the "Called to Care" Ministry:

1. Get-to-know-You Picnics. Carmen's class brings picnic food and games for this event during which families and their foster children get to know each other.

Meet Carmen Abernathy. The foster care experience is 2. Date nights. There is never a wrong way to offer a foster family a night out! The class members offer babysitting to give foster parents much-needed time off.

> 3. Handy-Man Day and Handy-Man Projects. Carmen's Sunday school group connected with a carpenter to help with building projects. They have helped with bedroom updates for foster children, organizing garages, spring cleaning, and plumbing.

> 4. Cutting Grass. The group heard that someone's lawnmower was broken so they went out and cut the grass.

> 5. Valentine's Day Meal Trains. What better way to say "I love you" than free food cooked by someone else! They helped cook dinner for 8-10 foster families and made Valentines goodies for the children.

> 6. Celebrations Events. They host church-wide celebration events for foster and respite families throughout the year. In the summer they host pool parties for families.

Carmen's Sunday School group is now dedicated to support 7. Christmas Parties. They host an annual Christmas party at the Mt. Bethel Community Center and provide gift baskets and crafts for the children.

> Carmen and her Sunday school group are just one example of so many among our church partners who choose to use their time, talent, and treasure to be a blessing to foster families and children.

> Thank you for being everyday heroes to our foster families and the children in their care!

"We are behind the scenes supporting the foster parents. We help coordinate fellowship events and provide additional support whenever it is needed," says Carmen.
